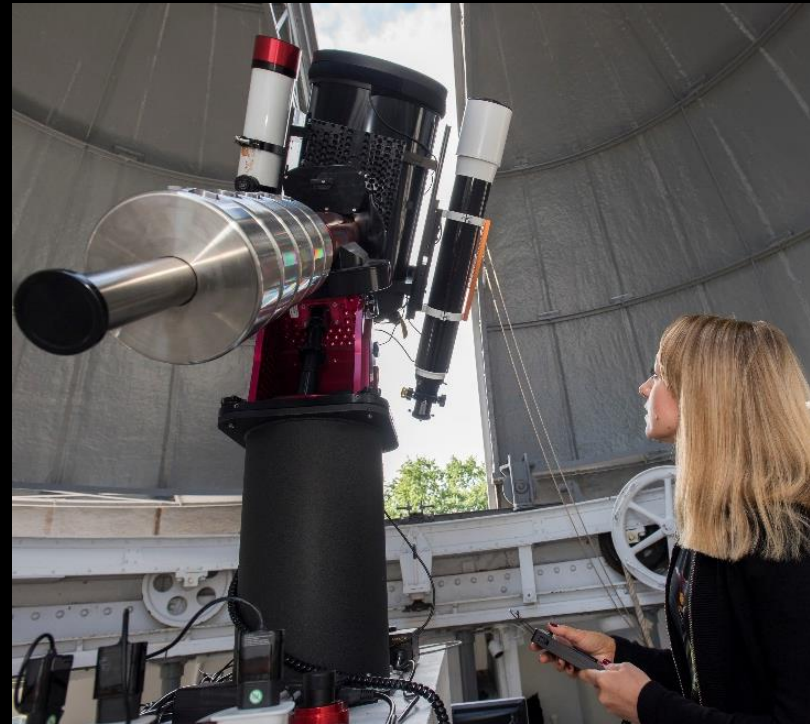




**The Royal Observatory Greenwich** is one of the world's most important historic scientific sites. Founded in 1675, it is the UK's first government supported science research centre and is globally recognised as the birthplace of modern astronomy.

Drawing visitors from across the world, highlights include the historic Prime Meridian, Greenwich Mean Time, chronometers that revolutionised navigation, London's only planetarium, telescopes, and three centuries of scientific instruments.

Today's aerospace, financial, digital, telecoms, rail, shipping, security & defence, insurance, and the space sector can all claim the Royal Observatory as part of their heritage.

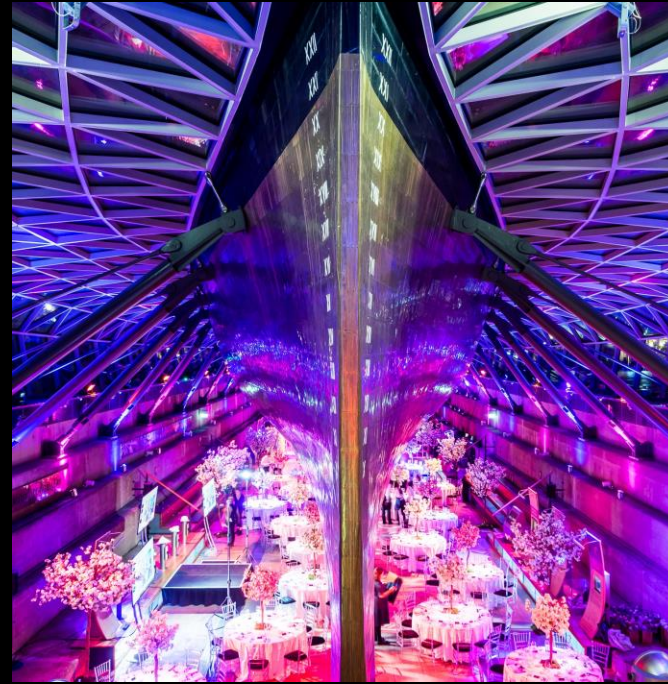




*Cutty Sark* is a global cultural icon of international trade. Launched in 1869, it marks the pinnacle of clipper design and was one of the merchant fastest ships of its day.

Now, the world's only surviving extreme clipper, it is a masterpiece of design and a breathtaking example of innovation, vision, speed, adaptability, resilience and success.

Cutty Sark is a truly unique part of London's iconic skyline and the first landmark seen by the millions of people who travel to Greenwich by river every year.





Refined, stylish and revolutionary, the white cube of **The Queen's House** sparked a design revolution that has influenced centuries of British architecture.

Commissioned by James I, The Queen's House was a luxurious retreat for both Kings and Queens and played host to the leading creative talents of the day.

Today The Queen's House sits right at the very heart of Greenwich and this stunning venue is truly the jewel in the crown of this UNESCO World Heritage site.

The same spirit of art and creativity continues today through stunning creative events and galleries filled with works by world-famous artists.





**The National Maritime Museum** is the cultural home of global trade.

Charting over 500 years of the movement of goods, people and ideas, is it the largest maritime museum in the world attracting millions of visitors of all ages.

The Museum boasts over 20 free galleries, a major temporary exhibition gallery and dedicated photography gallery, as well one of London's largest cultural event venues.
